OPERATING AND FINANCIAL REVIEW:

NATURE, OBJECTIVES AND STRATEGIES:

The members present their report and the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 July 2025.

Legal status

The College, founded in September 1980, was moved from the Schools to the FE sector under Section 28 of the Further and Higher Education Act (1992) as a College designated to receive FEFC funds. This was deemed necessary by Parliament in that as a voluntary aided College it did not own either its land or buildings. Although the governing body did not achieve governing body status under Further and Higher Education (1992), this was achieved under the Education Act 2000. The College is an exempt charity for the purposes of Part 3 of the Charities Act 2011. On 29th November 2022, the college sector was moved back into the public sector. These accounts include details of the impact of that change.

Mission

“At the very heart of our philosophy is the Gospel spirit of freedom, justice and love. We aim to affirm and value each member of the community, recognising the dignity and unique nature of each individual, whether student, support staff or teacher.”

This extract from the College mission statement underpins the philosophy of the College.

Implementation of strategic plan

The College’s objectives are set out in the strategic plan updated in July 2025 for the year ended July 2025. This plan includes the strategic direction of the College and financial forecasts. The Governing Body monitors the performance of the College against these plans. The plans are reviewed and updated each year. The College’s continuing strategic objectives are:

- To return to controlled student number growth. The revised number to be around 2,455 (FTE) in the year to July 2025.
- To review and maintain the high achievement rates for students within College. The achievement rate target remains at around 90%.
- To review the provision for adult education in the light of funding cuts.
- To encourage students to take responsibility for their own learning and promote and develop relevant learning strategies.
- Despite financial pressures, to make the necessary level of investment to maintain the high standards in learning resources in both the Learning Resource Centre and the IT Centre.
- To deliver the new build to time and budget.

The College is on target for achieving these objectives.

Implementation of strategic plan /Continued...

The College's specific objectives for 2024/25 and achievement of those objectives is addressed below:

- To achieve full time 16-19 students of 2,455 based on funding levels ie to grow modestly as the building is close to capacity occupation. Actual student numbers at September 24 were 2,540 which was higher than planned although given that the new build was due to be completed within the year this growth was manageable and more in line with the post 16 capacity fund requirements. The College will continue to manage this area closely.
- Outcomes in July 2025 are better than 2024, with a high grade outcome of 60%, which is the highest ever level of high grades achieved at Aquinas. Achievement (formerly success) rates of 88% (2023 87%) for all courses have been achieved in 2024/25. These are excellent outcomes for students who have experienced significant disruption to their teaching and learning
- To refine the Thrive model to offer individualised support to students. Further development of MyAquinas will allow targeted action and allow students to seek support. This will be further enhanced in 2024/25. A particular emphasis will be placed on attendance.
- To further develop the IT strategy group to oversee all IT strategy to enable the College to keep at the forefront of IT development, keep security in line with Cyber security requirements, keep up to date with AI developments for teaching and ensure that IT remains a support for curriculum delivery and is appropriate for the future. We continue to investigate innovative solutions like chromebooks for IT rich subjects. The college achieved the renewal of it's CSE cyber security accreditation in 2024/25.
- The New build was completed in December 24. Costs were slightly higher than budget but we had submitted the capital grant application before fully finalising the detail of the building. All grants, excepting the final element of £162k, have been received and that has now been confirmed as payable. Students have used building since handover for tutorial and RE which has meant that all students were able to enjoy the new facilities.

Financial plan

The College governors approved a financial plan in July 2025 which sets objectives for the year to 31st July 2027.

Financial Objectives

The College's financial objectives are:

- To achieve an annual operating surplus; and
- To further improve the College's shorter term liquidity.

The College uses a number of measures to assess and report on progress in both academic, pastoral and financial areas. These include but are not exclusively:

- Achievement rates, retention and attendance rates and Value Added.
- Learner destinations.
- Satisfaction survey (formerly “learner views”).
- Accounting measures such as cash days in hand, current ratios and indebtedness measures.
- Financial health assessments and minimum standards ratios.

The College is committed to observing the importance of sector measures and indicators and uses the FE Choices data available on the GOV.UK website which looks at measures such as achievement rates. The College is required to complete the annual Finance Record for the DfE. The College is assessed by the DfE as having a “Outstanding” financial health grading. The current rating of “Outstanding” is considered an excellent outcome given the financial pressure on the sector.

Public Benefit

Aquinas College is an exempt charity under the Part 3 of the Charities Act 2011 and is regulated by the Secretary of State for Education. The members of the Governing Body, who are trustees of the charity, are disclosed on pages 14 and 15. In setting and reviewing the College’s strategic objectives, the Governing Body has had due regard for the Charity Commission’s guidance on public benefit and particularly upon its supplementary guidance on the advancement of education.

In delivering its mission, the College provides identifiable public benefits through the advancement of education to 2,540 students, including 60 students with high needs. The College provides courses without charge to young people, to those who are unemployed and adults taking English and maths courses. The College adjusts its courses to meet the needs of local employers. The College is committed to providing information, advice and guidance to the students it enrolls and to finding suitable courses for as many students as possible regardless of their educational background.

FINANCIAL POSITION:

Financial Results

The College generated a surplus before other gains and losses in the year of £1,165k (2024: £1,376k), with total comprehensive income/(loss) of £983k (2024: (£1,272k)).

The trading surplus before FRS102(28) Local Government Pension Scheme adjustments to salaries and interest was £983k (2024: £1,255k).

Net actuarial pension losses totalling £182k (2024: losses £2,648k) arise from gains of £2,033k and losses of £2,215k following the application of an asset ceiling restriction of the asset to nil. Additional information is included in the accounting policies and note 21.

The College has accumulated general reserves of £11.521m (2024: £10.538m) and cash balances and short-term deposits of £9.318m (2024: £9.512m) of which £507k (2024: £449k) are amounts held as deposits on behalf of students. Reserves have been affected negatively by the FRS102(28) adjustments, with the asset ceiling restriction reducing the Local Government Pension Scheme asset to nil as at the 31st July 2025 (2024: £nil).

Tangible fixed asset additions during the year amounted to £2.3m. Of this total, £2m in Land and Buildings relates to the new build project with fit out costs for furniture and IT a further £213k with the remaining additions mainly relating to IT purchases although there have been small amounts spent on furniture and fixtures.

The College has significant reliance on the DfE for its principal funding source, largely from recurrent grants.

In 2024/25 the DfE provided 91% (2024: 89%) of the College's total income.

Treasury policies and objectives

The College has treasury management arrangements in place to manage cash flows, banking arrangements and the risks associated with those activities. Short term deposits are authorised by the Principal. All borrowing requires the authorisation of the Governing Body and the DfE.

The College has no plans to increase borrowings and has made the decision in 2024/25 to pay off the remaining loan of £781k so now has no outstanding commercial loan balance at July 25.

The College also has a gifts and hospitality policy which covers the procedure for the receipt of gifts / hospitality by staff.

Cash flows

The total net cash outflow of £194k (2024: inflow £943k) has arisen due to the completion of the new build at a cost of £2.2m, with £1.4m being received in capital grants during the year for that build. In addition, the last of the loans of £781k was settled. The underlying operations have generated around £2.7m in cash.

Liquidity

The College has settled the loan with Lloyds Bank PLC during the year. Despite that cost, college cash reserves remain robust and generate the maximum score of 100 on the liquidity measure.

Current and Future development and Performance

Reserves Policy

The College has no formal Reserves Policy but recognises the importance of reserves in the financial stability of any organisation, and ensures that there are adequate reserves to support the College's core activities. As at the balance sheet date the Income and Expenditure reserve stands at £11.521m (2024: £10.538m). It is the Governing Body's intention to increase reserves over the life of the strategic plan through the generation of annual operating surpluses to create a contingency fund. This can be negatively affected by movements on the FRS102 pension fund adjustments.

Financial health

Aquinas College has Outstanding financial health in 2024/25. We continue to achieve the maximum score of 100 for the adjusted current ratio as our cash balances are healthy and we deliver cash surpluses each year. During the year the variable rate loan was settled which has had a positive effect on our borrowing ratio achieving the maximum score of 100. The operating surplus for 2024/25 has generated 60 and we have achieved "outstanding" financial health with a score of 260.

We still deliver annual trading and cash surpluses and consider that costs are well controlled. We have a well-established business model and set prudent budgets which are then exceeded in the year. We have always delivered fairly modest surpluses but feel that most of our resources should be used to support students and their progress.

Student Numbers

In 2024/25, the College has delivered activity that has produced £13,059k in funding body main allocation funding (2024: £12,488k). Funding rates have been increased again in 2024/25. The College had 2,540 16-18 students on role. The College was inspected in April 2023 by OfSTED. A full inspection was undertaken and the "good" grade was reconfirmed.

Student Achievements

Students continue to achieve well at the College. In 2024/25, achievement is 88% (2024: 87%). We continue to strive for good outcomes for students.

At Aquinas we closely monitor curriculum development in our feeder schools and attempt to adapt our curriculum provision to match the needs and aspirations of our students. In recent years this has led to an expansion of vocational subjects to complement a largely academic provision. Provision at levels 1 and 2 is modest and new courses at level 3 tend to be introduced at a rate of one or two a year with the least popular courses disappearing at the same rate.

We have a focused approach to trying to get students on the most appropriate courses based on their prior attainment, whether this is the academic, vocational or indeed a blended route. A great deal of time is spent with each student to assess their needs during one to one interviews with a member of staff. We have introduced an additional series of checks and balances to further assess students in the early weeks of the course with a view to giving extra support or in rare cases to move them to other courses. Throughout their study programme students receive advice and guidance on identifying and applying for their next appropriate steps after college. For the majority of our students their path leads them to higher education. Increasingly we find students are seeking employment or apprenticeships and we have seen a growth in the number of students progressing to a Higher Level Apprenticeship. Our tutorial program evolves to support students in all aspects of their two year journey and their progression after college.

We continue to encourage students to select broad programmes of study to provide challenge and diversity and offer a high level of support, advice and guidance to assist them in making good decisions. We actively engage with the Local Authority in ensuring the full range of provision is available to the local population and are represented on the various strategic boards that exist. A particular strength at Aquinas is in preparing students to "have life and live it to the full".

The Adult and Continuing Education programme has a curriculum which is informed by local needs analysis in relation to regeneration and economic development. The programme features a curriculum which supports the DfE-adult/GMCA national target to increase the number of adults with basic skills and offers a thriving curriculum for those wishing to return to work, upskill or get involved in leisure courses.

Payment Performance

The Late Payment of Commercial Debts (Interest) Act 1998, in the absence of agreement to the contrary, requires organisations to settle debts within 30 days. During the accounting period 1 August 2024 to 31 July 2025, the College paid 99.9 per cent of its invoices within that 30 days. The College incurred no interest charges in respect of late payment for this period.

Events after the end of the reporting period

There are no post balance sheet events to note.

Future Prospects

The Principal, Danny Pearson, retires at the end of August 2025. He has presided over a period of quality improvement and the results in August 2025 are the best that have been achieved. He leaves the college in a strong position for the future. Our new Principal, Jo Dommett, has extensive experience as a Head of Sixth form and a Secondary Head and has had a handover period with Danny and the SLT to ensure that the transition is managed and successful.

We have now occupied the new building for 15 years, along with the completion of the new build in December 24. The funding for this additional building was secured due to the demographic growth in Greater Manchester and the fact that we could demonstrate growth over the years. This new build has allowed us to house all tutorial and RE activity there which means that all students experience the building.

The plan is for “creeping growth” of 20 students per year. Because of the difficulties of managing the oversubscription and predicting conversion rates we do experience some fluctuation (growth or small reduction) year on year as managing static student numbers remains an issue. We grew by around 115 in September 2021 taking the building close to capacity and needed to control numbers for September 22 and 23, as we could not risk another large increase. Actual student numbers in September 22 fell by 17 and September 23 grew by 29 which was a good outcome and ensured a smooth enrolment. In September 24 they once again grew by 116 but the new building allowed us to accommodate them easily.

Following the reclassification of colleges to the public sector, we have been subject to a number of new requirements. As a college we have always conducted ourselves as if we were in the public sector as we are wholly reliant on DfE funding to run the college. As such we do not feel that the changes will affect our operations. Some of the benefits of the Public Sector have been obtained by colleges eg the public sector pension guarantee, which has only led to a fall of 0.2% in the employer’s contribution. The abolition of VAT remains elusive. At the moment changes such as the lack of access to commercial borrowing have not affected us as we have significant cash reserves.

The increase in funding over the last couple of years has been welcome but costs are also increasing as the latest funding increase was to cover additional pay awards for staff. We run the College efficiently and look for further efficiencies such as natural wastage and staff leaving and not being replaced in full. Annually work is undertaken to manage staffing, tutorial, ethics and enrichment to deliver small surpluses and remain solvent.

Following the OfSTED inspection in April 2023 we received confirmation of the previous assessment of “Good”. There were many positive comments about our care for students and student outcomes. We will continue with our quality and pastoral program to ensure that the College continues to provide the best opportunities for our students and staff and address the small number of areas which were highlighted as needing some attention.

Catholic colleges are now able to academise but the Diocese of Shrewsbury are still deciding how they follow this direction with particular regard to the college. We continue to explore this option and currently they have allowed us to

explore options with other Catholic colleges but this area is still evolving.

The College has completed a two year plan in July 2025 and based on the method of calculation of financial health, the College is assessed as Good for 2025/26 and 2026/27. We achieve the maximum score of 100 for solvency and borrowings. Initial budget surpluses are low so do not generate a high score but still achieve the “good” rating. We have demonstrated over many years that we exceed initial budgets by the year end.

The College continues to review quality and pastoral teams and senior staff positions so they remain fit for purpose. Most students’ program of study comprises three subjects which means we have embedded the efficiencies for staff planning. We anticipate that surpluses will be maintained in the coming years and our cash balances remain healthy so it is appropriate that we use the going concern method of accounting in the preparation of these accounts.

Staff and Student Involvement

The College is a vibrant community and surveys carried out as students leave constantly refer to the positive atmosphere and sense of respect which pervades the College. The College continues to grow and be successful. The College encourages staff and student involvement through membership of formal committees.

RESOURCES

The College has various resources that it can deploy in pursuit of its strategic objectives.

Tangible resources include the main College site with the newly completed teaching block.

Financial

The College has £12.359million (2024: £11,376million) of net assets. A defined benefit scheme asset of £nil (2024: asset of £nil) for the College’s share of the net GMPF asset. Long term debt of £0k (2024: £855k) exist as at 31st July 2025. Tangible resources include the main College site, which consists of a £40million (2024: £40million) building completed in May 2010, the new build of £4m and an associated sports hall and facilities.

People

The College employs 289 (2024: 287) people (expressed as number of heads), of whom 170 (2024: 169) are teaching staff.

Reputation

The College has an excellent reputation locally and nationally. Maintaining a quality brand is essential for the College’s success at attracting students and external relationships.

Principal Risks and uncertainties

The College has undertaken further work during the year to develop and embed the system of internal control, including financial, operational and risk management which is designed to protect the College’s assets and reputation. The governing body has overall responsibility for risk management and its approach to managing risks and internal controls is explained in the Statement on Corporate Governance.

Based on the strategic plan, the Assistant Principal Finance along with the Senior Leadership Team (SLT) undertakes a comprehensive review of the risks to which the College is exposed. Systems and procedures are identified, including specific preventable actions which should mitigate any potential impact on the College. The internal controls are then implemented and the subsequent year’s appraisal will review their effectiveness and progress against risk mitigation actions. In addition to the annual review, SLT will also consider any risks which may arise as a result of a new area of work being undertaken by the College.

A risk register is maintained at the College level which is reviewed at least annually by the Audit Committee and more frequently where necessary. The risk register identifies the key risks, the likelihood of those risks occurring, their potential impact on the College and the actions being taken to reduce and mitigate the risks. Risks are prioritised using a consistent scoring system.

Outlined below is a description of the principal risk factors that may affect the College. Not all the factors are within the College's control. Other factors besides those listed below may also adversely affect the College.

1. Government funding

The College has considerable reliance on continued government funding through the further education sector funding bodies. In 2024/25, 89% of the College's revenue was ultimately public funded and this level of requirement is expected to continue. There can be no assurance that government policy or practice will remain the same or that public funding will continue at the same levels or on the same terms.

The College is aware of several issues which may impact on future funding:

- The lagged student number formula means that managing our student numbers is important. There is some uncertainty in this regard as we try to manage our oversubscription.
- The continued pressure on public finances with pre-school and post 16 being the only parts of the education budget that are not ring fenced. This means any future savings are likely to come from these areas.
- The continued political pressure to create more academies and free schools.
- The linear A level which could affect funding due to dips in retention and achievement.
- The devolution of the adult education budget and the ongoing interaction with GMCA and their changing requirements.
- The funding of adult courses which is relying on the student to fund more of the course costs.
- Further changes to pension employer contributions of both TP and GMPF which are not covered by Government grants.
- Inflationary pressure on the college's costs especially staffing costs and utilities.
- The possible devolution of further budgets to GMCA

The risk is mitigated in a number of ways:

- By ensuring the College is rigorous in delivering high quality education and training.
- By managing the programs of study.
- By placing considerable focus and investment on maintaining and managing key relationships with various funding bodies.
- By ensuring the College is focused on those priority sectors which will continue to benefit from public funding.
- Colleges move into the public sector may mean that we get more financial support in line with schools.
- By having regular dialogue with the local DfE/GMCA/Local Authorities.

2. Maintain adequate funding of pension liabilities

The financial statements report the share of the Local Government Pension Scheme asset on the College's balance sheet in line with the requirements of FRS 102. The employer's contribution rate has in the past been increased by the GMPF to cover any deficit and no capital sums are required. Following college's inclusion in the Government pension Guarantee, risk elements of the charge should be mitigated and hopefully large increases will be avoided. Teachers' Pension scheme is likely to increase over time but hopefully the grant support for this will continue.

3. *Failure to maintain the financial viability of the College*

The College’s current financial health grade is classified as “Outstanding” as described above. This is largely the consequence of prudent budgeting and the continued close control of costs and adjustments made to staffing to reflect curriculum need. Despite recent increases in funding, our cost base is also increasing and inflationary pressures quickly absorb the additional income. This risk is mitigated in a number of ways:

- By rigorous budget setting procedures and sensitivity analysis
- Regular in year budget monitoring
- Robust financial controls
- Exploring ongoing procurement efficiencies

Streamlined Energy and Carbon Reporting

The college is committed to reducing its carbon emissions and has taken the following measures in the year to improve energy efficiency:

- Installing Photovoltaic panels on the roof of the main building
- Designing and constructing the new classroom block to achieve ‘Net Zero’ energy standards. This runs on electricity only with air source heat pumps for heating and cooling and photovoltaic panels.

The work undertaken over the past few years has enabled us to actively monitor and assess energy usage so that we can aim to minimise our carbon footprint.

Qualification and reporting methodology

The College recognises the importance of these relationships and engages in regular communication with them through the College Internet site and by meetings.

Taxation

The College is an exempt body as far as the Charity Act is concerned. The College is not liable for Governing Body tax.

Employment Policy

The employment policy of the College has been agreed by the Governing Body and reflects the mission statement. The College is aware of, and its practice is consistent with, the terms of the Disability Discrimination Act (2000) updated by the Special Education Needs and Disability Acts 2001 and 2005. The College has a Human Resources Director and where appropriate, checks its procedures with a Human Resources Service to ensure consistency in HR matters. The College accesses support from our insurance HR helpline and a local firm of solicitors should any legal advice be necessary. The College has increased both the teaching and support staff as student numbers have risen. Vacancies for teaching staff are advertised in The Times Educational Supplement, LinkedIn and FE jobs. Support staff vacancies are advertised regionally or in professional journals. All vacancies are posted on the college website.

Teachers and support staff are paid using Sixth Form College Employers Scales. All staff are paid on a monthly basis.

Equal Opportunities and Employment of Disabled Persons

The College is concerned to encourage staff to improve qualifications and support staff have been offered training courses and apprenticeships and their fees have been paid by the College. Teaching staff have five in service training days in each year. Staff are provided with briefings weekly. These are meetings at which matters of immediacy are discussed. Contributions come from anyone – they are not restricted to management announcements. Notes are written up and published. More formal meetings are staff meetings and curriculum leader's meetings. In addition, there are small groups dealing with pastoral, quality and curriculum. The senior leadership team meets weekly.

The Governing Body is provided with regular and timely information on the overall financial performance of the College together with other information such as performance against funding targets, proposed capital expenditure, quality matters and personnel related matters such as health and safety and environmental issues. The Governing Body meets on a termly basis.

The Governing Body conducts its business through a number of committees. Each committee has terms of reference, which have been approved by the Governing Body. These committees are teaching and learning, resources, general purposes and employment, remuneration and audit. Full minutes of all meetings are available on the College's website at www.aquinas.ac.uk or from the clerk to the Governing Body at:-

The clerk to the Governing Body maintains a register of financial and personal interests of the governors. The register is available for inspection at the above address.

All governors are able to take independent professional advice in furtherance of their duties at the College's expense and have access to the clerk to the Governing Body, who is responsible to the Board for ensuring that all applicable procedures and regulations are complied with. The appointment and removal of the clerk are matters for the Governing Body as a whole.

Formal agendas, papers and reports are supplied to governors in a timely manner, prior to Board meetings. Briefings are also provided on an ad-hoc basis.

The Governing Body has a strong and independent non-executive element and no individual or group dominates its decision-making process. The Governing Body considers that each of its non-executive members is independent of management and free from any business or other relationship which could materially interfere with the exercise of their independent judgement.

There is a clear division of responsibility in that the roles of the Chairman and Principal are separate.

During 2024/25 all meetings were held in-person. Attendance was very good and ancillary meetings such as Governor training also took place in college.

Appointments to the Governing Body

The Foundation Governors are appointed by the Bishop of Shrewsbury. The two staff governors, the parent governor and two student governors are elected by their respective groups. There remain only two co-opted governors for which a search committee would be required and this would be instigated on an as necessary basis when new co-opted governors were needed. The Governing Body is responsible for ensuring that appropriate training is provided as required.

Members of the Governing Body are appointed for a term of office not exceeding four years.

Governing Body performance

The Governing Body has undertaken a self-assessment review and evaluation of performance for the year ended 31 July 2025 along with commissioning an external review of Governance. They have undertaken a review on Effective Governance and self-assessed their performance for the year. Outcomes from both reviews were extremely positive with an action plan being compiled for any areas identified for improvement. The college's internal auditors undertook an audit of Corporate Governance in 2022/23 and the overall conclusion was "strong", the most positive result. Outcomes of the self-assessment review were documented in the meeting of the 28th November 2024. The Governing Body will review its performance for 2024/2025 and report back to the Governing Body meeting on 25 November 2025.

The Chair and Clerk of Governors have attended a series of Governance webinars given by the Sixth Form College Association. Annually the Governing Body hold a training event which covers significant areas of college activity and any emerging issues.

The Governing Body has considered DfE guidance on board reviews.

Each committee also self-assessed their performance in the year with respect to their effectiveness and provision of information received from College and external parties.

Remuneration Committee

Throughout the year ended 31 July 2025, the College's remuneration committee comprised a Chairman and three other members of the Governing Body. The committee's responsibilities are to make recommendations to the Board on the remuneration and benefits of the Principal and other key management personnel.

Details of remuneration for the year ended 31 July 2025 are set out in Note 6 to the financial statements.

Audit Committee

The audit committee comprises a Chairman and two other members of the Governing Body (excluding the Principal and Chair). In addition, there are two independent co-opted members, who are not on the Governing Body. The committee operates in accordance with written terms of reference approved by the Governing Body.

The audit committee meets on a termly basis and provides a forum for reporting by the College's internal, regularity and financial statements auditors, who have access to the Committee for independent discussion, without the presence of College management. The Committee also receives and considers reports from the main FE funding bodies as they affect the College's business.

The committee has been quorate throughout the year.

The College's internal auditors review the systems of internal control, risk management controls and governance processes in accordance with an agreed plan of input and report their findings to management and the Audit Committee. Management are responsible for the implementation of agreed recommendations and internal audit undertake periodic follow up reviews to ensure such recommendations have been implemented.

The audit committee also advises the Governing Body on the appointment of internal and financial statement auditors and their remuneration for both audit and non-audit work as well as reporting annually to the Governing Body.

Internal Control

Reclassification

Since colleges were classified to the central government sector with effect from 29 November 2022, the Governing Body have overseen the process whereby policies, procedures and approval processes were updated to ensure compliance with the new requirements following reclassification. These revised documents identify where DfE approval is now required for pertinent transactions.

Scope of responsibility

The Governing Body is ultimately responsible for the College's system of internal control and for reviewing its effectiveness. However, such a system is designed to manage rather than eliminate the risk of failure to achieve business objectives, and can provide only reasonable and not absolute assurance against material misstatement or loss.

The Governing Body has delegated the day to day responsibility to the Principal, as Accounting Officer for maintaining a sound system of internal control that supports the achievement of the College's policies, aims and objectives, whilst safeguarding the public funds and assets for which he is personally responsible, in accordance with the responsibilities assigned to him in the Financial Agreement between the College and the funding bodies. He is also responsible for reporting to the Governing Body any material weaknesses or breakdowns in internal financial control.

The Purpose of the System of Internal Control

The system of internal control is designed to manage risk to a reasonable level rather than to eliminate all risk of failure to achieve policies, aims and objectives; it can therefore only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance of effectiveness. The system of internal control is based on an on-going process designed to identify and prioritise the risks to the achievement of College policies, aims and objectives, to evaluate the likelihood of those risks being realised and the impact should they be realised, and to manage them efficiently, effectively and economically. The system of internal control has been in place in Aquinas College for the year ended 31 July 2025 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and accounts.

Capacity to Handle Risk

The Governing Body has reviewed the key risks to which the College is exposed, together with the operating, financial and compliance controls that have been implemented to mitigate those risks. The Governing Body is of the view that there is a formal on-going process for identifying, evaluating and managing the College's significant risks that has been in place for the period ending 31 July 2025 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and accounts. This process is regularly reviewed by the Governing Body.

The Risk and Control Framework

The system of internal control is based on a framework of regular management information, administrative procedures including the segregation of duties, and a system of delegation and accountability. In particular, it includes:

- Comprehensive, budgeting systems with an annual budget, which is reviewed and agreed by the governing body
- Regular reviews by the governing body of periodic and annual financial reports which indicate financial performance against forecasts
- Setting targets to measure financial and other performance
- Clearly defined capital investment control guidelines
- The adoption of formal project management disciplines, where appropriate.

The Risk and Control Framework/Continued

The College has an internal audit service, which operates in accordance with the requirements of the DfE's Framework and guide for external auditors and reporting and College Financial Handbook. The work of the internal audit service is informed by an analysis of the risks to which the College is exposed and annual internal audit plans are based on this analysis. The analysis of risks and the internal audit plans are endorsed by the Governing Body on the recommendation of the audit committee. At minimum, annually, the Chair of Internal Audit (CIA) provides the governing body with a report on internal audit activity in the College. The report includes the CIA's independent opinion on the adequacy and effectiveness of the College's system of risk management controls and governance processes.

Risks faced by the Governing Body

The audit committee approves the risk policy, risk register and the College's assessment of risks and mitigation annually. At each subsequent meeting the College produces a risk report to reflect the active management of pertinent risks as the College year progresses. In addition, the Principal and Chair of Governors have very regular meetings to discuss the management of the College and the mitigation of risks faced.

Control weaknesses identified

The College undertakes a full program of internal audit to produce an annual opinion. The system of internal control has not significantly changed during the year and we have never had any significant control weaknesses raised by either internal or external auditors. The audit committee has obtained comfort over the control environment through a combination of the following:

- ensuring previous control weaknesses identified by internal audit have been addressed in a timely manner
- ensuring control weaknesses identified by management have been acted upon in a timely basis
- ensuring the control environment and underlying processes have remained consistent and stable
- obtaining comfort from the external audit performed and their findings
- reviewing the control findings from other assurance processes employed within the College
- obtaining up to date overviews of all the controls in place around the finance function

Responsibilities under Funding Agreements

Members of the Governing Body are responsible for ensuring that expenditure and income are applied for the purposes intended and that the financial transactions conform to the authorities that govern them. In addition, they are responsible for ensuring that funds from DfE, and any other public funds, are used only in accordance with DfE's grant funding agreements and contracts and any other conditions, that may be prescribed from time to time by DfE, or any other public funder, including that any transactions entered into by the Governing Body are within the delegated authorities set out in the "Dear accounting officer" letter of 29 November 2022, DfE's bite size guides. Members of the Governing Body must ensure that there are appropriate financial and management controls in place to safeguard public and other funds and ensure they are used properly. In addition, members of the Governing Body are responsible for securing economic, efficient and effective management of the Governing Body's resources and expenditure so that the benefits that should be derived from the application of public funds from DfE and other public bodies are not put at risk.

The Governing Body has met its contractual obligations under its funding agreements with the DfE through its work in its sub-committees, reports from management and reliance on the work of internal and external auditors.

Responsibilities under accountability agreements

The Department for Education introduced new controls for the college on 29 November 2022 on the day that the Office for National Statistics reclassified colleges as public sector organisations in the national accounts. The DfE chief executive communicated these changes to all college accounting officers and subsequently introduced a college financial handbook in 2024 updated in 2025. The college has reviewed its policies, procedures and approval processes in line with these new requirements to ensure there are systems in place to identify and handle any transactions for which DfE approval is required.

Statement from the audit committee

The audit committee has advised the governors that the Governing Body has an effective framework for governance and risk management in place. The audit committee believes the Governing Body has effective internal controls in place.

The specific areas of work undertaken by the audit committee this year are:

- the review of the findings of internal audit reports on Budgetary Financial Planning, Cyber Security, Learner numbers and Staff recruitment and retention.
- Annual review of the internal and external audit provision
- Termly review of risk management and mitigations

Review of Effectiveness

As Accounting Officer, the Principal has responsibility for reviewing the effectiveness of the system of internal control. The Principal's review of the effectiveness of the system of internal control is informed by:

- The work of the internal auditors
- The work of the executive managers within the College who have responsibility for the development and maintenance of the internal control framework.
- Comments made by the College's financial statements and regularity auditors in their management letter and other reports.

The Principal has been advised on the implications of the result of his review of the effectiveness of the system of internal control by the audit committee which oversees the work of the internal auditor and other sources of assurance, and a plan to address weaknesses and ensure continuous improvement of the system is in place.

The senior management team receives reports setting out key performance and risk indicators and considers possible control issues brought to their attention by early warning mechanisms, which are embedded within the departments and reinforced by risk awareness training. The senior management team and the audit committee also receive regular reports from internal audit and other sources of assurance which include recommendations for improvement.

The audit committee's role in this area is confined to a high-level review of the arrangements for internal control. The Governing Body's agenda includes a regular item for consideration of risk and control and receives reports thereon from the senior management team and the audit committee. The emphasis is on obtaining the relevant degree of assurance and not merely reporting by exception. At its 25th November 2025 meeting, the Governing Body carried out the annual assessment for the year ended 31 July 2025 by considering documentation from the senior management team and internal audit, and taking account of events since 31 July 2025.

The Audit Committee's Terms of reference were reviewed at the Spring term meeting. It is the view of the Audit Committee that it has fulfilled its terms of reference and operated in an effective and efficient manner.

Based on the advice of the Audit Committee and the Principal, the Governing Body is of the opinion that the College has an adequate and effective framework for governance, risk management and control, and has fulfilled its statutory responsibility for "the effective and efficient use of resources, the solvency of the institution and the body and the safeguarding of their assets".

Going Concern

The College has undertaken a thorough review in producing the 2 year plan. The College continues to enjoy a strong reputation for supporting students and achieving excellent results. This in turn means that the College is heavily oversubscribed for places so whilst not complacent we feel that student numbers are robust. The plan is predicated on a small growth of 40 students each year. For the last number of years, the College has delivered good surpluses and a healthy positive cash flow. We now hold a good cash balance and have paid off outstanding loan debt.

Going Concern/Continued....

We continue to review staffing and structures so that we can make management teams more efficient and reactive. We will continue to review Programs of study and allow most students to only study three courses which is consistent with linear A levels. This in turn will allow further efficiencies.

The recent increases in funding have meant that the College has delivered a significant surplus and therefore cash balances continue to improve. Our student numbers have increased by 116 for 2025/26 and we continue to predict positive cash inflow for the year.

The initial budget surplus set for 2025/26 shows a reasonable surplus and is based on prudent budgeting with more contingency within it than has been possible in prior years. Since that budget was set, we have had early indications that we will exceed the budgeted high needs income. There is still some residual uncertainty with regard to pay awards and utility costs for the coming year.

We should therefore produce a cash positive outcome in 2025/26 to add to the already healthy cash balances held.

The reclassification into the public sector is still not fully defined and some changes may occur but it is hoped that by working with the DfE, the sector can mitigate any of potentially negative impact.

After making appropriate enquiries, the Governing Body therefore considers that the College has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.







NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Statement of accounting policies

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the financial statements.

Basis of preparation

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting for Further and Higher Education 2019 (the 2019 FE HE SORP), the College Accounts Direction for 2024 to 2025 and in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102 – “The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland” (FRS 102). The College is a public benefit entity and has therefore applied the relevant public benefit requirements of FRS 102.

The preparation of financial statements in compliance with FRS 102 requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise judgement in applying the College's accounting policies.

Basis of accounting

These financial statements are prepared in accordance with the historical cost convention as modified by the use of previous valuations as deemed cost at transition for certain non-current assets.

Going concern

The activities of the College, together with the factors likely to affect its future development and performance are set out in the Strategic Report. The financial position of the College, its cashflow, liquidity and borrowings are presented in the Financial Statements and accompanying Notes.

The College has settled the last of the commercial loans in 2024/25 without a penalty charge. Alongside this the completion of the new building entailed college incurring fit out costs. As a consequence of this, the College's cash position shows a small fall of £194k in the year whilst the overall cash balances remain healthy at £9.3m.

Accordingly, the College has a reasonable expectation that it has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future, and for this reason will continue to adopt the going concern basis in the preparation of its Financial Statements.

Recognition of income

Government revenue grants include funding body recurrent grants and other grants and are accounted for under the accrual model as permitted by FRS 102. Funding body recurrent grants are measured in line with best estimates for the period of what is receivable and depend on the particular income stream involved. Any under or over achievement for the Adult Education Budget is adjusted for and reflected in the level of recurrent grant recognised in the statement of comprehensive income and expenditure. The final grant income is normally determined with the conclusion of the year end reconciliation process with the funding body following the year end and the results of any funding audits. 16-18 funding is not subject to reconciliation and is therefore not subject to contract adjustments.

Grants (including research grants) from non-government sources are recognised in income when the College is entitled to the income and performance related conditions have been met. Income received in advance of performance related conditions being met is recognised as deferred income within creditors on the balance sheet and released to income as the conditions are met.

Capital grant funding

Government capital grants are capitalised, held as deferred income and recognised in income over the expected useful life of the asset, under the accrual method as permitted by FRS 102. Other, non-governmental, capital grants are recognised in income when the College is entitled to the funds subject to any performance related conditions being met.

The recurrent grants from the DfE represent the funding allocations attributable to the current financial year and are credited directly to the statement of comprehensive income and expenditure. Recurrent grants are recognised in line with planned activity.

Non-recurrent grants from the funding bodies received in respect of the acquisition of fixed assets are treated as deferred capital grants and amortised in line with depreciation over the life of the assets.

Fee income

Income from tuition fees is stated gross of any expenditure which is not a discount and is recognised in the period for which it is received.

Investment income

All income from short-term deposits is credited to the statement of comprehensive income and expenditure in the period in which it is earned on a receivable basis.

Accounting for post-employment benefits

Retirement benefits to employees of the College are provided by the Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS) and the Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS). These are defined benefit schemes which are externally funded and contracted out of the State Second Pension.

Teachers' Pension scheme (TPS)

The TPS is an unfunded scheme. Contributions to the TPS are calculated so as to spread the cost of pensions over employees' working lives with the College in such a way that the pension cost is a substantially level percentage of current and future pensionable payroll. The contributions are determined by qualified actuaries on the basis of valuations using a prospective benefit method. The TPS is a multi-employer scheme and there is insufficient information available to use defined benefit accounting. The TPS is therefore treated as a defined contribution plan and the contributions recognised as an expense in the income statement in the periods during which services are rendered by employees.

Greater Manchester Pension Fund (LGPS)

The LGPS is a funded scheme. The assets of the LGPS are measured using closing fair values. LGPS liabilities are measured using the projected unit credit method and discounted at the current rate of return on a high-quality corporate bond of equivalent term and currency to the liabilities. The actuarial valuations are obtained at least triennially and are updated at each balance sheet date. The amounts charged to operating surplus are the current service costs and the costs of scheme introductions, benefit changes, settlements and curtailments. They are included as part of staff costs as incurred.

Net interest on the net defined benefit liability/asset is also recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income and comprises the interest cost on the defined benefit obligation and interest income on the scheme assets, calculated by multiplying the fair value of the scheme assets at the beginning of the period by the rate used to discount the benefit obligations. The difference between the interest income on the scheme assets and the actual return on the scheme assets is recognised in interest and other finance costs.

Actuarial gains and losses are recognised immediately in actuarial gains and losses.

Short term employment benefits such as salaries and compensated absences (holiday pay) are recognised as an expense in the year in which the employees render service to the College. Any unused benefits are accrued and measured as the additional amount the College expects to pay as a result of the unused entitlement.

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses. Certain items of fixed assets that had been revalued to fair value on or prior to the date of transition to the FE HE SORP, are measured on the basis of deemed cost, being the revalued amount at the date of that revaluation.

Where parts of a fixed asset have different useful lives, they are accounted for as separate items of fixed assets.

a. Land and buildings

The College's buildings are specialised buildings and therefore it is not appropriate to value them on the basis of open market value. Land and buildings are included in the balance sheet at cost. Leasehold land is not depreciated due to terms of the lease. Freehold buildings are depreciated over their expected useful economic life of 60 years.

All land and other College buildings belong to the Shrewsbury Diocesan Trustees and they remain the property of the Shrewsbury Diocese. This agreement operates under a Trust Deed between the College and the Diocese. No rent is paid by the College for the use of the facilities. On adoption of FRS 102, the College followed the transitional provision to retain the book value of land and buildings, as deemed cost but not to adopt a policy of revaluation of these land and buildings in the future.

If the land and buildings belonging to the Diocese had not been valued they would have been included within the College's accounts at historic cost. Expenditure on these buildings of a capital nature is capitalised by the College and included in the accounts at cost subject to depreciation being charged in accordance with the College's accounting policy.

Where land and buildings are acquired with the aid of specific grants they are capitalised and depreciated as above. The related grants are credited to a deferred capital grant account and are released to the statement of comprehensive income and expenditure over the expected useful economic life of the related asset and on a basis consistent with the depreciation policy.

Finance costs which are directly attributable to the construction of land and buildings are not capitalised as part of the cost of those assets.

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount of the fixed asset may not be recoverable.

Subsequent expenditure on existing fixed assets

Where significant expenditure is incurred on tangible fixed assets it is charged to the statement of comprehensive income and expenditure in the period it is incurred, unless it meets one of the following criteria, in which case it is capitalised and depreciated on the relevant basis:

- Market value of the fixed asset has subsequently improved
- Asset capacity increases
- Substantial improvement in the quality of output or reduction in operating costs
- Significant extension of the asset's life beyond that conferred by repairs and maintenance

b. Equipment

Equipment costing less than £1,000 per individual item is written off to the income and expenditure account in the period of acquisition. All other equipment is capitalised at cost. All assets are depreciated over their useful economic life as follows:

Fixtures and fittings	10% straight line
Motor vehicles and other assets	20% straight line
Computer and other equipment	25% straight line

Where equipment is acquired with the aid of specific grants, it is capitalised and depreciated in accordance with the above policy, with the related grant being credited to a deferred capital grant account and released to statement of comprehensive income and expenditure over the expected useful economic life of the related equipment.

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of any fixed asset may not be recoverable. Shortfalls between the carrying value of fixed assets and their recoverable amounts are recognised as impairments. Impairment losses are recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income and Expenditure.

Leased assets

Costs in respect of operating leases are charged on a straight-line basis over the lease term to the Statement of Comprehensive Income and Expenditure.

Leasing agreements which transfer to the College substantially all the benefits and risks of ownership of an asset are treated as if the asset had been purchased outright and are capitalised at their fair value at the inception of the lease and depreciated over the shorter of the lease term or the useful economic lives of equivalently owned assets. The capital element outstanding is shown as obligations under finance leases.

The finance charges are allocated over the period of the lease in proportion to the capital element outstanding. Where finance lease payments are funded in full from funding council capital equipment grants, the associated assets are designated as grant-funded assets.

Maintenance of premises

The cost of long term and routine corrective maintenance is charged to the statement of comprehensive income and expenditure in the period it is incurred.

Provisions are recognised when the College has a present, legal or constructive obligation as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the amount expected to be required to settle the obligation is recognised at present value using a pre-tax discount rate. The unwinding of the discount is recognised as a finance cost in the statement of comprehensive income in the period it arises.

A contingent liability arises from a past event that gives the College a possible obligation whose existence will only be confirmed by the occurrence or otherwise of uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the College. Contingent liabilities also arise in circumstances where a provision would otherwise be made but either it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required or the amount of the obligation cannot be measured reliably.

Contingent liabilities are not recognised in the balance sheet but are disclosed in the notes to the financial statements.

Agency arrangements

The college acts as an agent in the collection and payment of certain discretionary support funds and any other arrangements. Related payments received from the funding bodies and subsequent disbursements to students are excluded from the income and expenditure of the college where the college is exposed to minimal risk or enjoys minimal economic benefit related to the transaction.

Taxation

The College is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK governing body tax purposes. Accordingly, the College is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by sections 478-488 of the Governing body Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

The College is partially exempt in respect of Value Added Tax, so that it can only recover a minor element of VAT charged on its inputs. Irrecoverable VAT on inputs is included in the costs of such inputs and added to the cost of tangible fixed assets as appropriate, where the inputs themselves are tangible fixed assets by nature. The College's subsidiary companies, if such existed, would be subject to governing body tax and VAT in the same way as any commercial organisation.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash includes cash in hand, deposits repayable on demand and overdrafts. Deposits are repayable on demand if they are in practice available within 24 hours without penalty. Cash equivalents are short term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash with insignificant risk of change in value. An investment qualifies as a cash equivalent when it has maturity of 3 months or less from the date of acquisition.

Financial liabilities and equity

Financial liabilities and equity are classified according to the substance of the financial instrument's contractual obligations, rather than the financial instrument's legal form.

Financial liabilities and equity

All loans, investments and short-term deposits held by the College are classified as basic financial instruments in accordance with FRS 102. These instruments are initially recorded at the transaction price less any transaction costs (historical cost). FRS 102 requires that basic financial instruments are subsequently measured at amortised cost, however the College has calculated that the difference between the historical cost and amortised cost basis is not material and so these financial instruments are stated on the balance sheet at historical cost. Loans and investments that are payable or receivable within one year are not discounted.

Judgements in applying accounting policies and key sources of estimation uncertainty

In preparing these financial statements, management have made the following judgements:

- Determine whether leases entered into by the College either as a lessor or a lessee are operating or finance leases. These decisions depend on an assessment of whether the risks and rewards of ownership have been transferred from the lessor to the lessee on a lease by lease basis.
- Determine whether there are indicators of impairment of the College's tangible assets. Factors taken into consideration in reaching such a decision include the economic viability and expected future financial performance of the asset and where it is a component of a larger cash-generating unit, the viability and expected future performance of that unit.

Other key sources of estimation uncertainty

- *Tangible fixed assets*
Tangible fixed assets are depreciated over their useful lives taking into account residual values, where appropriate. The actual lives of the assets and residual values are assessed annually and may vary depending on a number of factors. In re-assessing asset lives, factors such as technological innovation and maintenance programmes are taken into account. Residual value assessments consider issues such as future market conditions, the remaining life of the asset and projected disposal values.
- *Local Government Pension Scheme*
The present value of the Local Government Pension Scheme defined benefit asset depends on a number of factors that are determined on an actuarial basis using a variety of assumptions. The assumptions used in determining the net cost (income) for pensions include the discount rate. Any changes in these assumptions, which are disclosed in note 21, will impact the carrying amount of the pension asset. Furthermore, a roll forward approach which projects results from the latest full actuarial valuation performed at 31 March 2022 has been used by the actuary in valuing the pensions assets and liability at 31 July 2025. Any differences between the figures derived from the roll forward approach and a full actuarial valuation would impact on the carrying amount of the pension asset or liability. The actuaries have once again reported a pension surplus as at the year end. This year the College commissioned an additional report containing an asset ceiling calculation which concluded that the asset would not result in a reduction in future pension contributions. Under FRS 102 a pension asset should only be recognised if it is expected to result in a refund or a reduction in future contributions. Whilst the asset ceiling calculation depends on a variety of assumptions and therefore contains inherent uncertainties, the College has decided to reduce the pension asset to nil to reflect the result.

• *Capitalisation of land and buildings*

The College operates from a site comprising three buildings, the main college building, the Oscar Romero building and the sports hall. Each of these buildings are owed by the Diocese of Shrewsbury for the benefit of the college. They were paid for by a combination of funding council grant support, bank loans and college resources. The main building received 93% government funding support. As the buildings were completed the costs were capitalised and the grant received was included in the balance sheet. As these buildings age, they are depreciated and the appropriate portion of the grant released. If the Diocese were to change the use of the building, the grant amount would be repayable and the site handed back to the funding bodies to realise any proceeds. As a consequence of this it is felt that the most appropriate treatment is to include the buildings as fixed assets and depreciate them over their useful life.

The pension costs are assessed in accordance with the advice of independent qualified actuaries. The latest formal actuarial valuation of the TPS was 31 March 2020 and of the LGPS 31 March 2022.

Employees and Employers Contributions amounting to £209k (2024: £174k) were payable to the scheme as at 31st July 2025 and are included in creditors.

Teachers' Pension Scheme

The Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS) is a statutory, contributory, defined benefit scheme, governed by the Teachers' Pension Scheme Regulations 2014. These regulations apply to teachers in schools, colleges and other educational establishments. Membership is automatic for teachers and lecturers at eligible institutions. Teachers and lecturers are able to opt out of the TPS.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme and members contribute on a 'pay as you go' basis – these contributions, along with those made by employers, are credited to the Exchequer under arrangements governed by the above Act. Retirement and other pension benefits are paid by public funds provided by Parliament.

Under the definitions set out in FRS 102 (28.11), the TPS is a multi-employer pension plan. The College is unable to identify its share of the underlying assets and liabilities of the plan.

Accordingly, the College has taken advantage of the exemption in FRS 102 and has accounted for its contributions to the scheme as if it were a defined-contribution plan. The College has set out above the information available on the plan and the implications for the College in terms of the anticipated contribution rates.

The valuation of the TPS is carried out in line with regulations made under the Public Service Pension Act 2013. Valuations credit the teachers' pension account with a real rate of return assuming funds are invested in notional investments that produce that real rate of return.

The latest actuarial review of the TPS was carried out as at 31 March 2020. The valuation report was published by the Department for Education (the Department) in October 2023. The valuation reported total scheme liabilities (pensions currently in payment and the estimated cost of future benefits) for service at the effective date of £262 billion, and notional assets (estimated future contributions together with the notional investments held at the valuation date) of £222 billion giving a notional past service deficit of £40 billion (compared to £22 billion in the 2016 valuation)

As a result of the valuation, new employer contribution rates rose from 23.68% to 28.68% from April 2024.

A full copy of the valuation report and supporting documentation can be found on the Teachers' Pension Scheme website.

The pension costs paid to TPS in the year amounted to £2,257,216 (2024: £1,918,196).

Greater Manchester Pension Fund

The scheme available to non-teaching staff is the Greater Manchester Pension Fund (GMPF). The total pension contribution made by the College to the Scheme for the year ended 31 July 2025 was £544k of which employer's contributions totalled £412k and employee's contributions totalled £132k. The agreed employee contribution rates for future years (effective from April 2014) are a tiered system of rates related to levels of pensionable pay – these currently range from 5.5% to 12.5%. Following the issuing of the Pension Guarantee by Government, the GMPF undertook a review of rates. This resulted in a reduction from 19.7% to 19.5% which will continue until March 2026. The next triannual valuation is due in March 2026.

The college distributes 16-19 discretionary and vulnerable bursaries and free meals in further education (FEFM) funds to students as an agent for DfE. In the accounting period ended 31 July 2025, the college received a total of £340k and disbursed £273k from DfE 16-19 discretionary and vulnerable bursaries and FEFM funding after charging £17k for administration costs.

As at 31 July 2025, the cumulative unspent 16-19 discretionary and vulnerable bursary funds and FEFM funding is £314k. Very late in the 2024/25 financial year, the DfE sent a further FEFM allocation of £79k which we were unlikely to spend. We are in the process of asking the DfE to take that back. Once that is done we are confident that they will be no funds in scope to be returned to the DfE in March 2026. Comparatives for the accounting period ended 31 July 2024 are £340k received from DfE, £320k disbursed to learners after charging £17k for administration costs, and total cumulative unspent funds of £166k, of which £0 was repaid to DfE.
